"No Reward"

"Who among you would say to your slave who has just come in from plowing or tending sheep in the field, 'Come here at once and take your place at the table'? Would you not rather say to him, 'Prepare supper for me, put on your apron and serve me while I eat and drink; later you may eat and drink'? Do you thank the slave for doing what was commanded? So you also, when you have done all that you were ordered to do, say, 'We are worthless slaves; we have done only what we ought to have done!"

Luke 17: 7-10

Dear Friends,

First, let me express my hope and prayers that each of you are as well as can be under our current circumstances. I can tell you that my experience of this pandemic has been emotionally debilitating, physically exhausting, and spiritually challenging. I can only imagine that each one of you have had your struggles, ups and downs, fears, and frustrations. My prayer has been for the peace of Christ to move steadily and continually through our lives; and my discovery has been that when I am attentive to Christ, he most certainly is attentive to me. Keep the faith, dear friends. In the midst of negative feelings, exhaustion, and challenge: Keep the faith.

One thing stands in our way of keeping the faith, however, and that is our cultural relationship to authority. There is an odd rhetoric to these times which uses words like, emptiness... or nothing... or stasis.... or boredom, et cetera, as though everyone remaining separate from each other were entirely unproductive. But I was reading the May 27 interview between Dr. Anthony Fauci, a key member of the President's Covid-19 task force, and Judy Woodruff, anchor of the PBS Newshour, and Dr. Fauci highlighted several times that staying home and staying separate is a necessary and direct action against the spread of the Coronavirus: an action that the whole nation must take together for it to work. Does sitting for weeks on end, separate from your community, friends, and family, feel like direct action to you? Probably not. But why?

One part of our response has to do with how we respond to authority. A second part of our response has to do with our inbred emotional need for recognition. As the parent of a toddler, I have fresh firsthand experience with these two things. On the one hand, human beings – and Americans in particular – don't like to be told what to do. But the reality is that perspective and knowledge and experience are what make someone's opinion valuable. While talking about reopening our country for instance, Dr. Fauci said this to Ms. Woodruff:

...there are certain fundamental, basic things that, no matter what stage you're at, you need to do it. And that's things like wearing masks, staying physically distant, avoiding crowds, washing hands. Those are things you should do no matter what. (http://www.pbs.org/newshour)

That's Dr. Fauci's opinion. Then my neighbor Jim, a very intelligent person, well read, and a doctor of jurisprudence says, "Anyone who wears a mask is bowing to tyranny!" That's Jim's opinion. But part of Jim's opinion has to do with the fact that Jim doesn't like to be told what to do. It has to do with authority. If you told Jim it was wrong to mow his lawn on Sundays, Jim would only mow his lawn on Sunday. And he'd make sure 'Ol' Glory' (the stars and stripes) was flapping in the breeze as he did so. But the truth of the matter is, that when it comes to a global health crisis, Jim's opinion doesn't matter because he is not in possession of the medical perspective, knowledge, and experience which are required in this situation to form an opinion that benefits the entire population. To put it simply, on the issue of wearing a mask, Jim's opinion doesn't matter. And when it comes to reopening our churches for the public worship of God and other ministries, we're going to trust the opinions that do matter.

This brings us to our second problem: affirmation. At breakfast, when my 2 year old eats his cereal – as I've asked 3 times – before grabbing another handful of raspberries, I applaud and say, "Yay! you did it! Good job Elliott!" And that's how all of us are with everything. But there's no overt, outward, audible applause for doing the kinds of things Dr. Fauci has insisted upon. No one will congratulate us for staying home: we've only obeyed the authority that matters. No one will applaud when we put on a mask as we exit our vehicles, or before entering a store: we've only done what we were asked. No one will thank us for washing our hands repeatedly to the point of mental fatigue: we're only doing the minimum of what is necessary.

Because of these two problems, authority and affirmation, our nation has not weathered this storm as well as other countries where the population simply obeyed the recommendations of people who knew what they were talking about. New Zealand, for instance, a country of 5 million people. Almost immediately after the news broke from China, Prime Minister Jacinda Ardern took the advice of her public health officials and shut the country down completely. New Zealand has had about 1500 confirmed cases of the coronavirus, and 21 related deaths... and no new cases for several days. We've topped 100,000 deaths in the United States. Why? Because we're not united. Period.

This problem follows us into the church, where allegiance to our own point of view and those who agree with us often overrides the commandment to love each other unconditionally. But if we're going to come out of these circumstances stronger as congregations, we have to trust the person whose authority means more than anyone's feelings or opinions: Jesus Christ. When you feel like getting mad at a fellow church member, or at me: don't. When you feel like giving up on your faith community: don't. Trust the Spirit to give you strength, and your trust will be rewarded, not with any outward sign, but with the inward witness that you have done what you were asked by the One who loves you.

Everything from taking up old tiles (with a sledge hammer), me to putting in a new floor, also me to new plumbing fixtures, Joe to a whole lot of shelving, painting and papering. We also did a lot of praying as I am sure you also did that we would be kept safe, and everyone around us that we are connected to would also be safe and healthy. God has graciously heard our prayers. I hope he has heard yours.

You will notice when you come back to Church eventually, that the pile of rock and stone and dirt have been taken care of, finally. Another problem taken care of with a little prayer and some work.

I guess what I am trying to say here today is, yes, I know it's hard to be home all the time, yes, it's hard to wear those masks, and yes, I miss going to Church too, but the thing we need to remember is that all this time while we have been doing what we are supposed to be doing, is that God was with us and still is.

Finance Report

I pray everyone has continued to stay healthy during this Corona virus/Covid 19 crisis, and that I hope we will soon be back at IFUMC to worship together. As you know, Alicia and I started to sort out the financial situation mid December 2019 along with help from Pastor Jonathan and Marie. After going through stacks of unorganized files and making calls, we discovered multiple bills unpaid as far back as June 2019. One of the Consumers Energy accounts was going to an email somewhere, and was 8 months behind. Some of the bills that were behind were the UMC Pension Fund (Benefits Ministry Share) at \$300.00 a month, our Conference Ministry Shares at \$1,596.00 a month, and the payment on our Promissory note at \$1.177.74 a month, and some others. Paying many of these between January and March 2020 meant that we ran a deficit between income and expenses of about \$8000. Happily, at this point we are turning things around and are starting to figure out where we are financially.

Pastor Jonathan and myself have spent many, many hours organizing the church finances to get accurate numbers for all line items. We have put new policies and procedures in place that make everyone and everything accountable. At the end of March we have most bills current. We have balanced and accounted for all credits and debits for 2020. If you have any questions, I would be happy to answer them. Thank you for your patience while we unraveled the paper work for IFUMC.
