# From the desk of Pastor Jon

## Sin: The Little Word with Big Meaning

There are just over one thousand three letter words that are legal for play in the game of Scrabble (1,015 to be precise). Even though my word processor's spell check doesn't recognize them, gat, gis and gua are the ones that start with Q and you'll notice that only one of those has a U. If you play the game, you'll want to remember this little tip. You're welcome.

But, that's a lot to remember just for a game you probably only play once or twice a year. Then, again, little words are around us all the time. We probably know most of the list already. Who needs to really take the time to learn the extras?

One of the words that might be difficult for many people in a few years is "sin". There's less and less that our society qualifies as being sinful. As our moral and legal standards for behavior in society change, it's likely that there will be a declining understanding about this little word. So, we'll be taking some time to explore it.

Our sermon series for July and much of August will have a focus on the so-called seven deadly sins: pride, wrath, lust, greed, envy gluttony, and sloth. Of course, we're not all about the negative side so we'll be talking about the seven corresponding virtues as well: humility, patience, chastity, liberality, kindness, abstinence and diligence.

You'll notice that there's very little on this list that, in and of itself, could qualify as a crime. No one goes to jail just for being wrathful (otherwise half the internet would be behind bars). Gluttony is practically celebrated. Envy is encouraged with almost every commercial we watch. Don't get me started on lust (don't worry, when we get to that week, we'll keep it PG). Our culture embraces sin on many levels and, mostly, the church is quiet and acquiesces to the shifting moral sands around us.

Yet, if we read the Bible, the gospels specifically, we notice that Jesus raises the bar regarding sin rather than lowering it. Jesus (Mt. 5) challenges us in several areas including: murder (don't even call someone a fool), adultery (don't even look with lustful eyes), oaths (it's not about not breaking them, don't make them in the first place), justice (turn the other cheek) and enemies (pray for them and love them). Jesus' ethic of love challenges many of us to examine our attitudes, words and behaviors. Sin isn't just a little thing for Jesus.

As we examine sin, I want to encourage you to pray regarding your own spiritual life. This might be a good time to schedule an appointment with me for "an annual checkup." (Hey, if you do it for your body, eyes and teeth, isn't it worth doing for your soul?) Pray for the ministry of the church as well, that we might lovingly think, speak and act in ways that promote virtue.

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At Bill Weisgerber's funeral, he was described as being a "pillar" of his church and community. That word "pillar" motivated several thoughts. One, when I was an elementary sixth grader, we had an in depth study of Greek mythology, art, and history. At that time, it was classified as social studies. I clearly remember all the picture of the Acropolis and the Parthenon. We used Ivory soap and carved the three types of columns or pillars, Doric (the plain one), Ionic (the one with scrolls), and the Corinthian (the fancy one). The columns were constructed in such a way that they appeared straight, but were not. These faithful supporters of the roofs were built so strong that they have survived all sorts of trauma throughout the last 2,500 years. Bill, described as being a "pillar of his church," was a strong supporter of his church. He not only was a member, but he believed in and promoted the missions of the church in every possible way. People not only admired him, but relied on his leadership and knowledge. He truly was a "pillar" upholding the church in all its'

endeavors. However, he was only one person. There were and are many others. One pillar alone cannot do the job.

In the Bible pillars are mentioned many times, pillars made of various materials and for various purposes. But to be lasting, They had to be built on a firm foundation.

My questions today are: Do we here at First have pillars? Who are they? What are they doing? How are they supporting our church? Are you a pillar? Do you want to be a pillar?

My answer is "Yes" we have pillars. But other pillars are needed to support and strengthen our structure. Remember, the words of that hymn. "I am the church! You are the church! We are the church together!..... The church is not a building. The church is not a steeple, the church is not a resting place, the church is people!" And the people have to be the "pillars!" We have need of several strong pillars! Won't you consider being one of those pillars?

# **REACH**

equipping churches to reach more people

During the Calendar year of 2015 -- Pastor Jon participated in the REACH initiative sponsored by the Michigan Conference of the United Methodist Church. These monthly seminars provide for pastor development in the implementation of a series of *Ministry Systems* that are facilitating positive growth results in churches throughout our country.

One of those *Ministry System* components is Small Groups. In support of that initiative and participation in the small group training, lead to an invitation to participate in the REACH, Small Group Seminar with Pastor Jon, held at the Swartz Creek UMC in Lansing. This experience provided the encouragement that there is HOPE for our church to achieve the growth results that many other churches are experiencing.

Last fall there was a launch of a unique **Worship** series, coupled with a series of **Small Group** offerings. These are just a couple of the *Ministry Systems* that make up the big picture. In November a worship planning focus group was very helpful in identifying topics of need and interest for our congregation(s), which has been implemented thus far this year via several sermon series.

This spring a couple of focus groups were held to help guide the process and the implementation of these systems. Pastor Jon provided these groups with an overview of these Ministry Systems. (Worship Planning, Evangelism, Assimilation, Small Group, Ministry Mobilization, Stewardship, Leadership, and Strategy Systems -- anchored by the Relationship component.) These focus group sessions have been very fruitful and are expected to continue through this implementation phase.

As this process has evolved over this past year, we have found ourselves in various roles. Although we have supported the implementation of the two systems noted, the function of evaluation has been primary. So, we have been referring to ourselves as "the evaluation team". As we work through this process, we welcome your input. We encourage participation . . . it is an exciting journey. Please let us know if you would like to participate in any way. We as a congregation have the potential within our REACH!
