### THE JOURNEY

### UMW NEWS

This last week I was introduced to a Hebrew word, ezer. Perhaps this is a new word for you also. After God created Adam and placed him in the garden, he determined that it was not good for man to be alone. He then created a woman to fill the void in his life. She was called an *ezer* in the Hebrew-the original language of the Old Testament. Most translations render the word *ezer* as helper, however, the word means much more than that according to some. The word appears 21 times in the Old Testament: twice in Genesis describing the woman, 16 referring to Yahweh as the helper of his people, and 3 in the books of the prophets referring to military. *Ezer* is a strong helper. Some interpret *ezer* as in helping to rescue, save or support.

How can we use the word?

I want to think of our United Methodist Women as strong helpers, using our time and talents to help those around us to be all that God created them to be, speaking and doing acts of encouragement, kindness, and caring.

As you UMW board diligently strives to be an ezer for others, we sincerely offer the opportunity for others to join us in efforts to do God's will. As you know, we consider each woman in our congregation a member of the United Methodist Women because we realize that each and every one of you are participating in some way in our work of the church.....serving in the soup kitchen, quilting, ushering, greeting, being a member of a committee, teaching, donating to various missions, assisting with special events, hosting coffee hours, gardening, decorating, calling, chauffeuring and visiting shut-ins.

But.....yes, there's that word again.....BUT, someone has to organize, plan, and coordinate all these activities. We have several new projects that we desire to pursue, but we need "advice, in-put, and suggestions" before we can undertake the challenges.
