Ionia First — November 2024

Greetings in the Name of Christ!

I am writing from Rwanda, where I have traveled to teach a class on reconciliation. Overall, the trip has been fine. I flew from O'Hare Field in Chicago to Addis Ababa in Ethiopia, a flight of about 14 hours. Fortunately, the flight was not full, and I had good legroom. I spent five hours at the Addis Ababa's airport, and then flew to Kigali in Rwanda, a 2.5 hour flight.

I received a great welcome in Rwanda Sunday, and presented two keyboards and a laptop computer to the Conference lead clergy person. Monday, I began teaching the class on reconciliation.

Grounded in the New Testament teachings of Jesus and Paul, reconciliation is a thoroughly Christian concept. In Matthew 5, Jesus warns his followers to reconcile their differences before making their offering to God, In Romans 4: 8-11, Paul argues that because of Christ's righteousness, humanity has been reconciled to God, and II Corinthians 5:16-20, Paul calls Chrisian believers to a ministry of reconciliation.

Currently, the concept of reconciliation has grown and broadened, with applications around the world, especially in areas where violence and war fracture social relationships. Although they do good work, unfortunately, many practitioners of reconciliation have forgotten or neglected its biblical roots.

I am teaching reconciliation using biblical and secular means to pastors in Rwanda who have been mandated by their government to learn reconciliation processes. One significant hurdle faced by these pastors is their unwillingness to engage in reconciliation activities with people of a sexual orientation other than heterosexual. This takes integrity from their work because God's grace is not being extended to all persons. I am hopeful that over time they will grow to embrace all persons in God's love.

We are fast approaching year end and the Season of Advent and Christmas. We are planning for a joint Ionia First/Easton Christmas Eve worship service to be held at Ionia First on Dec. 24. I am hopeful you can attend. Also, we will hold a service of healing Sunday, Nov. 10. Our district superintendent will participate in this event.

The Ionia First and Easton churches have many congregation members who have lost loved ones over the past year. The journey of grief is often long, and support can be a helpful gift. The Easton Church is exploring the possibility of hosting a grief support group for persons who have lost loved ones. I hope this group may be also of interest to members of Ionia First.

Also, please be in prayer for Sally Flanders, Easton's musician. She had eye surgery Oct. 30 and has a recovery period of over six weeks. We pray for her complete recovery and a successful operation. Remain in prayer also, for the members of our churches who are experiencing health challenges and are in need of God's healing mercies.

The people of the Methodist Church in Rwanda send their greetings. With your continued prayers, this conference can overcome old prejudices and truly be a source of reconciliation for all people.

As promised, the results of the Chicken-pie Supper of December 14, 1910 are as follows. The report states the supper brought in \$151.07 and expenses were \$48.00. That \$48.00 bought a lot of items, including 6 pounds of coffee for \$2.25; 7 quarts of milk for 45 cents; 36 loaves of bread for 6 cents each; one and a half bushes of potatoes for 45 cents; 18 quarts of cranberries for \$2.00; 20 cakes for \$8.00; 12 quarts of pickles for \$1.80. As you can see, the dollar went a long way in 1910.
